Rules for Authors

Inland Water Biology publishes original and topical manuscripts which deal with biology, morphology, systematics, ecology, and ecological physiology and biochemistry of hydrobionts; ethology of aquatic organisms, and their populations and communities; aquatic toxicology, patterns of the biological cycle; the structure and functioning of aquatic ecosystems; anthropogenic impact on aquatic organisms and ecosystems; protection of aquatic ecosystems and organisms, and the methods of hydrobiological research. All papers are reviewed and considered by the Editorial Board. The main criteria for publication of the manuscript are the importance of the problem, novelty of the results, validity of conclusions, and clarity of presentation. Review articles should provide a new insight into the problem and offer new trends of studies.

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The Editorial Board encourages authors to follow the following guidelines:

1. Manuscripts should be accompanied by a letter and the copyright transfer agreement with Pleiades Publishing, Ltd in an electronic version (the agreement form is provided at the website <http://pleiades.online/authors/agreement>).

2. The manuscript should not exceed 32 typewritten pages, including the list of references, tables, and figures).

3. The first page of the manuscript should include: (1) the title of the article; (2) the given name(s) and family name(s) of each author; (3) authors' affiliations (where actual work was done) with the full postal addresses; (4) the e-mail address of the corresponding author; (5) the manuscript submission date and (6) the abstract. The abstract should state briefly the purpose of the research, the principal results and major conclusions. Then it follows by keywords, the text of the manuscript and the list of references.

4. The text of the article should be subdivided into sections. The following standard headings are recommended: *Introduction*, *Materials and Methods* (please avoid describing commonly known published procedures, but describe all substantial modifications used by the author); *Results* (presented in a logical order in the text, tables, and figures; only the most important observations or experimental results should be noted in the text; do not duplicate information found in tables and figures); *Discussion* (the significance of the results, their position among other studies of the subject, possibilities and limits of application, and further research goal); *Conclusions*. Other necessary headings (except headings of review articles) should be placed at the beginning of the corresponding paragraph.

5. The manuscript should be submitted as an electronic file in Microsoft Word 2003 format with the following margins: top, 2.5 cm; bottom, 2.5 cm; left, 2.5 cm; right, 1.2 cm. The text, tables, and footnotes should

be Times New Roman 12-point font, double-spaced (2.0). All the pages of the manuscript should be numbered in the upper right-hand corner.

6. Abbreviations (except common ones) when are unavoidable should be explained at the first mention in the text. The International System of Units (SI) is used.

7. Formulas which have references in the body of the text should be indented and numbered. The radical sign should be avoided and replaced by a fractional exponent. A decimal point is represented by a period, and a multiplication sign is indicated by a centered dot. Subscripts and superscripts should be explained. Headings and the text are typewritten in lowercase letters except the first letter at the beginning of the sentence and proper names. The species names of hydrobionts when they are first mentioned should be in Latin with an indication of the author. Taxonomic names: genera and species should be in *italics*.

8. Works cited should be presented under the heading References, listed in the alphabetical order, and numbered at the end of the paper.

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
